15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

In the increasingly complex and interconnected world of the 21st century, multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary education has emerged as a forward-thinking approach that encourages the blending of knowledge from different fields. A common view is that research and education should integrate the humanities, Commerce and sciences in order to promote a comprehensive understanding of the world. This paradigm shift fosters critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills by integrating insights from multiple disciplines. The goal of our institution is to create research centers that concentrate on the nexus between the humanities and sciences. In addition, we are developing diversity and inclusion programs that encourage the participation of other perspectives including those from the humanities, Commerce and sciences in research and teaching. Our Institution has made the decision to plan outreach initiatives, talks, and events that emphasize how closely related to all disciplines are. Our mission is to equip researchers and students to tackle difficult, real-world problems that call for a synthesis of technological, scientific, humanistic, and ethical and Commercial viewpoints. Our Institution provides creative and adaptable curricula, including credit-bearing classes and projects.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Embracing NEP's Flexibility: Our ABC Initiatives The New Education Policy (NEP) 2020 introduced by the Government of India marks a paradigm shift in the country's educational landscape. Aimed at fostering a more flexible, holistic, and multidisciplinary approach to learning, it seeks to empower students with the skills and knowledge necessary to thrive in a rapidly evolving world. One of the key aspects of the NEP is its emphasis on flexibility—an essential trait that encourages creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving abilities in students. In this context, our ABC Initiatives—which stand for Adapt, Build, and Cultivate—are designed to embrace this flexibility, ensuring that both students and educators are better equipped to meet the dynamic demands of the

21st century. Recognizing NEP's focus on student mobility and personalized learning, our institute embraces the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) with several initiatives. We've reconstructed curricula, established credit accumulation mechanisms, and built IT infrastructure. Student orientation, faculty training, and robust quality assurance systems ensure effective implementation. We actively register courses for multiple entry/exit options across UG and PG streams. To foster collaboration, clear communication, interdepartmental partnerships, and well-defined projects with measurable objectives are encouraged.

17.Skill development:

The NEW EDUCATION POLICY 2020, is implemented in our Parents University for PG program with the goals of promoting high-quality education. The Institution has arranged a number of workshops, like Soft Skill Development Workshop in collaboration with SGBAU, Amaravati to give students access to a platform for their overall development, a start-up program and Code of Conduct Workshop to maintain ethical standards. The institution has organized workshops to make the campus eco-friendly by reducing chemical waste and by conserving energy. The Institution has its local chapter of MOOCs like SWAYAM and NPTEL. Institution have the recognition as Career Katta hub, to provide students access to online courses for the preparation of competitive examinations. With zeal and enthusiasm pupils participated in poster presentation, essay competition, and model presentation which was organised on the occasion of National Science Day. Assigning project work, internships, and organisation of industry trips resulted into the improvement in various skills of students. The Department of Political Science organizes voter awareness campaigns, Constitutional Day celebrations, and Human Rights Day events for junior and senior students to aware them about national duties and responsibilities. The cultural committee honours great National Heroes and freedom fighters by celebrating and organising guest lectures on the Birth and Death Anniversaries of National Heroes. The college offers certificate programs and organizes group discussions, seminars, quiz contests, essay writing, elocution contests, and debates to raise students' social and moral awareness. The college's NSS unit is quite active and plans socially engaged, interactive events for the students. The college hosts various events to foster social consciousness and good behaviour among students, such as reading campaigns, blood donation camp, village cleanliness campaigns, pollution-free initiatives, tree planting, and AIDS and cancer awareness rallies etc.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The integration of Indian Knowledge Systems into modern education is crucial for preserving cultural heritage and promoting holistic learning. The departments like Urdu, Persian, Marathi, and Political Science are focusing on traditional and ancient aspects. Teaching languages, such as Marathi and English is essential to connect students to their cultural roots and to preserve linguistic diversity. Cultural immersion, including traditional arts, literature, and philosophy, is also essential to provide students with a nuanced understanding of India's cultural landscape. Centres for Maulana Azad National University and Yashwantrao Chavhan Open University are run by the college. The college's cultural council encourages students to put on plays and dances that showcase Indian cultures, such as Marathi, Banjara, and Marwari. By forming literacy associations, the college hopes to bring students closer to Indian culture while also preserving and promoting languages and igniting their interest in literature, languages, and culture. In honour of Independence Day, the Marathi department hosts SPANDAN, an annual forum for artwork, each year. Lectures and workshops on Indian art forms like music, dance is organized by the college to promote and preserve Indian culture. The Women Development Cell at a college hosts workshops and seminars to empower women, while the Home-Economics department hosts exhibitions of traditional work. Platforms like SWAYAM, NPTEL, and have made progress in this direction. By integrating Indian Knowledge Systems, we can empower future generations, promote India's heritage globally, foster national identity.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is a transformative approach that focuses on achieving specific learning outcomes. i. Institutional Initiatives to Transform Curriculum towards OBE Curriculum Redesign: On the basis of the academic calendar provided by the parent university every faculty member prepared their own academic planning. Faculty Training: Teachers are allowed to attend various seminar conference FB DP short term courses refresher and orientation courses. A workshop for non teaching staff was organised in this session. Stakeholder Involvement: Engaging stakeholders such as industry experts, alumni, and employers to ensure the curriculum meets real-world demands and expectations. Assessment Methods: Apart from the traditional method of evaluation MCQ based test, quiz competition, Seminar competition are also organised for the students assessment. Efforts to Capture OBE in Teaching and Learning Practices Active Learning Strategies: Institutes various departments use incorporating active learning strategies such as problem-based learning, and group projects to ensure students engage with the

material in a meaningful way. Continuous Feedback: Every faculty member takes continuous feedback through internal assessment, valuation of the answer sheets. Technology Integration: Integration of technology through various means and using language laboratory computer lab and Google Classroom. Outcome Mapping: Slow/advanced learner test, unit test, seminar, assignment and project are given to the student for continuous assessment throughout the year. Iii. Good Practices Pertaining to OBE in View of NEP 2020 Holistic and Multidisciplinary Education: For the holistic development of the student NSS department and sports department along with cultural department organised various events and programmes. Skill Development: Certificate courses were run by the English and Urdu department to improve the various skills of the students. Flexibility in Learning: Offering flexible learning paths and multiple entry and exit points in programs, allowing students to learn at their own pace and according to their interests. Community Engagement: Blood donation camp, residential camp, social awareness programmes and activities are the initiatives and practices that helps institution to implement OBE effectively.

20.Distance education/online education:

NEP emphasized distance education / online education expand the access to education and training for employed students. The Institute has already started working on these aspects. Teachers are encouraged to develop e-content and online teaching material. To cope up with the advanced teaching skills and to understand current online teaching trends. The institute is registered as SWAYAM-NPTEL Local Chapter and the students are encouraged for enrolling on the SWAYAM-NPTEL courses from where the students can earn credits from these courses. Our Institution offers YCMOU and MANUU Courses through ODL mode that can help institution to reach out to students in remote areas, who may not have access to quality vocational education otherwise. However, offering YCMOU and MANUU courses through ODL mode institution do careful planning and implementation to meet the needs of the students. In addition, institution has an adequate infrastructure and resources to support ODL mode of education which includes dedicated team of faculty members, appropriate technology infrastructure and high-speed internet connectivity. Overall enrolment of 793 students in YCMOU and 92 students in MANUU courses through ODL mode proved viable option for institution looking to expand its reach and provide quality education to a wider audience.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Our teachers have played a crucial role in professional development and curriculum creation. At the beginning of the academic year, the curriculum is accessible in the central library and on the institution website for both educators and students. Following the curriculum guidelines, teachers formulate their academic plans and obtain approval from the principal. Each educator presents the syllabus to the students and clarifies the distribution of marks across topics and the exam format. In addition, teachers provide a range of multiple-choice questions, personal assessments or exam timelines, assignments, and seminars. Some educators maintain their own YouTube channels and WhatsApp groups to facilitate better communication, additionally organize guest lectures, assign projects, and offer subject-related certification courses. The IQAC evaluates the entire teaching, learning, and assessment process by gathering feedback from all stakeholders. The institution also undergoes audits related to both academics and administration. Images from each event, tagged on Google, are recorded. Teachers maintain a record using a daily diary. Seminars, conferences, and various other events take place regularly. The head of the department supervises the curriculum and the daily logs are finalized by the principal at the end of each month.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Heterogeneous classes of higher educational institutes require multiple teaching-learning methodologies. Hence, it becomes essential that the HEIs identify the advanced and slow learners so that no student is left behind in the educational process. Process of identifying Advanced and Slow Learners: Our teachers identify the advanced and slow learners at the beginning of the academic year. To do so, the teachers conduct a test on the subject knowledge of respective subjects and marks obtained by the students is a basic criterion for the identification of slow and advanced learners. Moreover, even while delivering the lectures, teachers identify them by asking oral questions. Accordingly, the college teachers apply altogether different strategies to enhance the learning capabilities of these students.

a) Special Programme for Slow Learners such as 'Special Coaching, Remedial Coaching, Guest lectures etc. The mentors always encourage and guide the slow learners to solve the question papers of the previous semester.

Heterogeneous classes of higher educational institutes require multiple teaching-learning methodologies. Hence, it becomes essential that the HEIs identify the advanced and slow learners so that no student is left behind in the educational process. Process of identifying Advanced and Slow Learners: Our teachers identify the advanced and slow learners at the beginning of the academic year. To do so, the teachers conduct a test on the subject knowledge of respective subjects and marks obtained by the students is a basic criterion for the identification of slow and advanced learners. Moreover, even while delivering the lectures, teachers identify them by asking oral questions. Accordingly, the college teachers apply altogether different strategies to enhance the learning capabilities of these students.

a) Special Programme for Slow Learners such as 'Special Coaching, Remedial Coaching, Guest lectures etc. The mentors always encourage and guide the slow learners to solve the question papers of the previous semester.

b) Special Programme for Advanced Learners: Organization of seminars and group discussions, Essay writing, quiz, surprise tests, debate and elocution competitions are organized for them.
