1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The institution established under Vidya Prasarak Mandal Darwha in 1971 with Arts and Commerce faculty. Later on Science Faculty and H.S.C.Vc. have been started in 1983 and 1992 respectively. Besides these faculties, our institution has Arts and Commerce Faculty at Junior college level established in 1975 and a Faculty of Science (non-grant) at the same level has been opened in 2008. It comes under UGC Act of 1956, **2(F) and 12(B) since 1987** and continuation from 2012.

The institution is enriched with highly qualified, well-experienced and dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff. The institution runs **03** UG, **03** PG and **04** Ph.D. Programmes. There are **24** full-time faculties, out of which **07** Professors, **4** Associate Professors and **13** are Assistant Professors. Total **19** faculties are Ph.D. holders while **05** are pursuing Ph.D. Two faculty members are on BOS of S.G.B Amravati University and 01 member is on autonomous institution and 01 faculty has been working on Board of Physical Education and Sports. One of the staff members has worked on a committee to establish new Pali and Buddhism Department at University. The institution encompasses sprawling campus of **07** acres and Gymnasium Hall and many play grounds in a **15** acres land which is 3 km away from the campus. In last five years **10** students have won University Color Coat in various sports events. It is a great matter of pride that **11** students have also shown flying colors in the academic fields and have grab rank in the merit list of University. The institution has successfully organized **01** International, **05** National, **02** State, **14** University level conferences, e-conferences/workshop, e- workshop and 01 FDP on NAAC. More than 1500 students are enrolled every year.

The institution arranges various activities to imbibe and inculcate social, moral, patriotic, spiritual and national values among the students.

Codes of professional ethics guide all stakeholders of the institution about its principles of integrity, accountability, inclusiveness, commitment and sustainability. All stakeholders work within the institutional policies and practices so as to satisfy the '*Vision and Mission*'.

The institution successfully completed Green Audit and ISO certification of the campus. The institution was accredited with 'B' Grade (Score 2.05) in second cycle by NAAC.

- (8) The campus is Wi-Fi facilitated.

- (10) The campus is under CCTV surveillance.
- (11) Well-equipped laboratories.
- (12) Registered Alumni Association.
- (13) Distance Education Center.
- (14) Due to excellent faculties, facilities and admirable results, the strength of the students have been increasing day by day.
- (15) Relationship among the members of management, staff, students and parents is truly harmonious. The faculty members are healthy minded and without bias or prejudice for each other.
- (16) An active Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a vital role in the monitoring, augmentation and

sustenance of the overall quality of the institution.

Institutional Weakness

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Our institution is a constituent institution of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University and follows a pre-designed syllabus of the Parent University. However, the institution innovates within these established academic structures, committed to provide holistic development. **Two staff members are the members on Board of Studies in the Parent University from Arts and Science faculty who are contributing to curriculum design and its implementation. One member is also on autonomous institution and 01 faculty has been working on Board of Physical Education and Sports. One of the staff members has worked on a committee to establish new Pali and Buddhism Department at University.**

The Principal conducts meeting and discusses the status of syllabus, extra classes, unit tests, internal examinations, practical's and other activities. Industrial tours, visits to historical, biological and environmental places are arranged for the first-hand knowledge and practical purpose. The institution always tries its level best to fulfill its aim and objectives. The students are inspired to aspire higher level of academic achievements. Bolstering its academic credentials, institution offers some subject related certificate courses. The institution strives towards overall development of the students and quality enhancement of the learners through various aspects of personality development.

The certificate courses are introduced by several departments to impart employable and life skill education to the students. Students make the optimal use of advanced e-facilities in library including N-list, online books facility where students can access to more than three million books.

At our institution education is dialogic and it is the feedback system which gives transparency and accountability. Feedback data is compiled, analyzed and shared with each department and concerned individuals for prompt action.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-learning and evaluation is executed as per the academic plan of the institution. A few introductory classes are held to identify slow and advanced learner by their performance in the regular classes and in tests. Accordingly institution engages the students in remedial coaching classes. The use of ICT is made to create interest and better comprehension of the course. The PPT's presentation is done by almost all teachers. The guest speakers from other colleges are invited to give refreshing change to the students. The students are given more exposure by sending them on study tours, field visits, industry visits, inter-collegiate science exhibition, debates, seminars and poster competitions, workshops etc. Students are encouraged and supported by the study materials. The mechanism of Internal Assessment is transparent and objective. Institution sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender discrimination and environment consequences.

The evaluation procedure is elaborated in the classrooms and restated to ensure effective implementation of the

internal assessment. Students are assessed on various platforms continuously through innovative and reformed techniques such as group discussions, assignments, interview, viva-voce, tests, practical's and projects etc. Students are encouraged to participate in inter-collegiate competitions to optimize their potential.

The Programme Specific Outcome (PSO's), Programme Outcome (PO's) and Course Outcome (CO's) are evaluated in the IQAC meeting to prepare effective action plan of the institution. The resolution of the meeting with some fruitful suggestions faculty members are forwarded for the implementation to ensures the achievements.

Research, Innovations and Extension

To promote research activities among the faculty members and students, the institution constituted the Research Promotion Cell (RPC).

Out of **24** permanent faculty members, **19** have completed doctorate degree (Ph.D.), **05** are registered for pursuing Ph.D. degree, **13** M.Phil. and **08** faculty members cleared NET/SET examination. In last five years **88** research papers have been published by faculties in UGC listed and reputed journals, **155** research papers presented in conferences and **20** chapters in the books. **Seven** faculty members are recognized as supervisors by the Parent University from different discipline and **09** research scholars are enrolled and have been working for the award of doctorate degree. One of the faculty members has availed an advantage of Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP).

Even after sanction and follow up by the institute, funds of two Minor Research Project by UGC worth Rs. 5,90,000/- has been not released.

The majority of faculty members attended and presented research papers in National/ International Conference, Seminar, Workshop through online/offline mode and also published the research papers in peer reviewed National and International Journals. Apart from this, **01** faculty member has been working as an associate-editor of International Journal of Basic and Applied Research, one faculty member is working on editorial board, one on advisory board and one on peer review committee of International Research Journal having ISSN standard. The institution has organized conferences/ seminars at National/ International level with issues on Research Methodology, FDP on NAAC, IPR etc.

Many extension activities like Cleanliness Drives, Voter Awareness Programmes and Rally, AIDs Awareness Rally, Road Safety and Security, Blood Donation Camp, Superstition Eradication Programme, My Family My Responsibility, Women's Equality and Gender Sensitization Programme etc. are undertaken during the last five year.

In last five years, the institution has signed MOU's with some HEI's, Industries and NGO's.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution encompasses a large campus of 22 acres of land. Supportive facilities are also developed for effective ambience for curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular and administrative activities. The institution has well-constructed building comprising, Management Chamber, Principal Cabin, **30** Class Rooms, **09** ICT Rooms, **06** Laboratories, Library, Reading Room, Staff Room, Administrative Block, NSS office, IQAC Room,

Gymnasium Hall, Seminar Hall, YCMOU study center etc. The institution has sport fields and facilities for the outdoor and indoor games.

Institute Library has total **25,679** books on different subjects, **46** Journals/Periodicals and also a member of e-resources consortia N-List having e-journals and e-books. The library has other sources of information like Maps, Charts, CDs, M. Phil./ Ph.D. Thesis and Audio/Video Cassettes to cater the needs of the users. Library uses SLIM 21 automation software for the effective functioning. The subscription of N-list in library gives an access to students to browse more than 3 million books online. Three Bar- Code Scanners, a bar-code printer, a reprographic machine are available. Barcoding of the books is in progress.

The first aid facility is available in the sport department. CCTV cameras are installed at some major places. The campus is facilitated with Internet, Wi-Fi, Solar Power Plant, Water filters with cooler, 03 AC's, canteen and Rain Water Harvesting. Every year there is a free medical checkup camp for students. The institution has **50** computers with internet facility, **11** LCD projectors all in one (including Kyan), **12** printers, a scanner, a photo copy machine, a reprographic machine, **03** inverters, a power generator and Broad Band connection.

Institution ensures optimum use of infrastructure facilities and regular maintenance as well as to upkeep of all facilities through trained and efficient staff and a system of periodic checks.

Student Support and Progression

Institution has a fabric of social inclusion and empowerment, through student-centric financial incentives and welfare measures. Institution provides all the information and facilitates to students to secure scholarships from government. The scholarships are availed to the students belonging to SC, ST, OBC and minority category. All basic information and facilities offered by the institution are clearly reflected in the prospectus.

The institution has been organizing '**Vision for Career**' programme since 2010-11. Under this practice, the institution provides guidance for various competitive examinations, Motivational Camps and Lectures on Personality Development such as Small-Scale Industry Development Camp, Entrepreneurship Camp, Self Employment Camp, Competitive Examination Guidance, Spoken English Skills, and Career Guidance Cell etc. For the lavish workshop on '**Vision for Career**' many experts and renowned speakers from all over Maharashtra are invited. Entrepreneurship Skills and Vision for Career workshops have been organized to avail the platform for job opportunities.

The institution has '**students' Grievance Redressal Cell and Student Counseling Cell**' which help to redress complaints regarding sexual harassment and ragging. **Women Development Cell** takes all necessary measures to ensure safety and all-round development of the girl students.

As per the guidelines of University, 'Students' Council' is constituted every year. Institution provides special remedial coaching classes, extra coaching classes for the slow learners and some innovative activities/ideas for advanced learners.

To facilitate students' progression to higher level of education, institute has started PG courses.

Institution also has an Alumni Association to keep in touch with ex-students of the institution. Every year institution publishes magazine 'Vasundhara' to create and develop writing skills of the students. In last five years **10** students have won University Color Coat in various sport events.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Institution has a transparent and multi-layered governance system. The Governing Body of the institution meets regularly to discuss issues related to the overall development and performance. Similarly, College Development Committee and IQAC meetings are held periodically for the effective planning and implementation of teaching-learning and administrative activities.

The institution takes extreme care to carry out its vision and mission. Institution is very careful right from the admission process about economically backward students and provides better facilities, infrastructure and necessary tools.

The Management and the Head of institution insist on decentralization and democratic system of administration. The principal encourages positively the staff members to participate and share their views, ideas and innovative concepts for effective and positive working.

As per Government rules, the institution has implemented welfare schemes and a range of development oriented programmes for the teaching and non-teaching staff. The institution follows Performance Appraisal procedures as per the norms of Government of India. All the new circulars from the University and the Government are circulated among staff. CAS is a decentralized system of the institution. Group Insurance facility is provided to the staff. The Medical reimbursement facility is available to the staff members as per Government norms.

The institution conducts internal and external financial audits on regular basis. The audit wing of the UGC asks periodically and inspects all files pertaining to the financial matters that the institution has availed off, as well as all the receipts and payments records are being maintained.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Institution prepares its own prospectus which contains information regarding academic calendar, programmes, courses, curriculum, fee structure, various major committees like sexual harassment, anti-ragging, codes of conduct etc. The Academic Planning Committee prepares the academic planning for institution and faculty members to follow it. Some of the faculty has made a significant contribution in designing and improving the curriculum of Parent University. As per curriculum, every faculty member prepares his/her own academic planning and it is approved by the Principal. Every department individually introduces the syllabus, marks/gradation system and structures of question paper of their respective subjects. Each teacher takes the initiative to use different teaching methods for the better delivery of the curriculum. Apart from the traditional teaching, teachers use digital and virtual teaching methods. They broadcast study materials through You tube channels, Google Classroom, WhatsApp etc. Some teachers use Testmoz and Google Forms to conduct the test and collect various feedbacks from stakeholders. For overall catering of the curriculum, teachers organize educational tours, industry visits, guest lectures, student and teacher exchange activity, fieldwork, projects work and subject-related Certificate Courses etc. Remedial Classes, bridge courses and mentoring for slow learner, extra tests and quiz competition for the advance learner have been conducted. As a part of curriculum institution conducts Unit tests and Home assignments to improve the quality of the teaching and learning process. The monitoring agency monitors the completion of curriculum and other activities carried out by the faculty. If, for any reason, a faculty fails to finish his/her syllabi within the stipulated time, he/she takes extra classes to compensate the backlog. Bridge course/ Induction course has been specially organized for all first year students.

Well-equipped science laboratories, well-enriched library, language lab, computer lab with Wi-Fi connectivity are available for the students and faculty. Computer lab is accessible to students and teachers. The institutional library has a vast collection of books in various disciplines and of general interest. The library also has subscribed periodicals and journals, popular magazines, newspapers and an **Online Public Access Catalogue (WEB-OPAC)**. It has availed the membership of N-List (INFLIBNET), there is a reading room in the library. Many events are recorded with Google tags photographs. To be updated academically, teachers are allowed to appear for SWAYAM courses. For research development there are **four** research centers and **seven** recognized Ph.D. supervisors. The IQAC monitors the overall teaching-learning process by collecting student feedback. Institution also undergoes academic and administrative audit.

Important Features:

1. Some of the faculty has made a significant contribution in designing and improving the curriculum of Parent University.
2. The monitoring agency monitors the completion of curriculum and other activities carried out by the faculty.

3. In addition to traditional question- answer teaching methods, teachers use digital teaching methods such as PPT`s.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The institution believes in recognizing, encouraging and nurturing diverse talent and aptitude of the students. It encourages competitiveness and yearning for perfection. The objective is to inculcate the potential of students, so they venture beyond the set curriculum. The concept of parallel education runs deep in our curriculum and so all the departments of the institution organize seminars, conferences, study tours and other academic activities to achieve the goals. The assignment/home assignments are the mandatory part of the curriculum which helps in understanding the pragmatic issues related to students at the micro level. Each department analyses the results at the end of each semester.

As per University's examination schedule, the institution adjusts the academic calendar for the internal examination. The academic calendar is prepared well in advance for the next academic session and displayed on the notice board for reference of the staff. It is also uploaded on the website for all the stakeholders. It carries approximate schedules regarding admission process, teaching-learning schedule, evaluation blueprint, curricular and co-curricular activities, extra-curricular activities, major departmental and institutional events to be organized and dates of vacation and holidays. The rules and regulations concerning the evaluation process are conveyed by each subject teacher during regular classes. Students are also informed about the distribution of marks on the commencement of every academic session. Any queries or discrepancies are resolved out to the full satisfaction of students and teachers. The uploaded information can be accessed by anyone at any time. The institution also has evaluation monitoring committee. Students can approach to concerned teachers and committee members for any query and clarifications. The examination committee works on the slots reserved in the academic calendar for internal assessment and prepares and displays the timetable well in advance. Slow learner test examinations and assessment of the short term is conducted separately by the respective departments. In view of continuous evaluation and improvement in the performance of the students, the institution follows the practice of assignments, projects work, seminars, viva-voce, presentations etc. The institution takes care that the invigilation duties of teachers are assigned keeping in view of their evaluation schedules. The entire internal assessment process is highly transparent as the assignment/class test scripts are returned to the students after the evaluation and grievances if any are resolved. Some of the tests, quiz are conducted and evaluated by third parties, such as 'Gandhi Thought' essay competition, poster competition etc. In addition field visits, study tours, industrial visits, and project work are mandatory for some of the courses, which help to hone students' understanding of the topic.

The following are the crucial aspects of the academic calendar.

Response

Institution has many forums, where such issues are not only highlighted but also students are given direct exposure towards it. Naturally each teacher integrates all these issues as a part of their teaching-learning process. In the faculties like Arts, Commerce and Science all these aspects are thoroughly addressed and discussed during teaching-learning process.

Environmental Issues:-

Various departments of the institution organize outdoor excursions to help the students to achieve practical knowledge about environmental and sociological issues. Institution monitors hazardous waste management activity through Chemistry department. These activities are executed by students under the guidance of the expert teachers. In addition to this, tree plantation programmes has also been arranged with the objective of promotion to protect environment and good health practices. Various plants are planted in the garden to beautify the campus from hygienic point of view. NSS unit plays a pivotal role in bringing awareness on sociological issues. Environmental studies is a mandatory subject for all second year classes of graduation and some environment related topics are the part of the syllabus of history, Economics, Marathi, English and Physics. Institution has successfully conducted green audit of the campus.

Human Values:-

Our institution has taken various steps to imprint importance of human values on the minds of all stakeholders. NSS unit is a very active organ of the institution, working for inculcating human values among students. Human Values are taught through various subjects like languages as well as literatures such as Marathi, English, Marathi literature, Urdu, Urdu literature, Persian literature, Sociology, Political Science, Economics, History etc. ICT also plays an equally important role in keeping students well aquatinted with socio-economic, cultural, political and other issues with appropriate use of facilities like Wi-Fi, OPAC, INFLIBNET etc. Institutional Library provides various books where students can learn the importance of human values.

Professional Ethics:-

Many events and competitions, which propel the mind and promote inner skills are intended and executed very often in the institution. Some departments of the institution arrange various Certificate Courses like Job Oriented Skills, Certificate Courses in Writing Skills for Media, Language Proficiency Skill etc. in accordance with the professional ethics. Workshops on 'Women Empowerment and Entrepreneurship' and Women Safety, Security and Employability are arranged frequently through 'Women Development Cell'. In commerce and management, professional ethics are implanted. Communication and Soft Skill have a place in many of these courses. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The assessment of the learning levels of the students have been done by the teachers in the classrooms during lectures and through conducting class tests, seminars, project works, assignments, tutorials and practical which helps to identify slow and advanced learners. Need of specific teaching-learning methodologies of such students are then discussed and implemented. An integrated approach is followed in the classes by the faculty. Traditional teaching methods are aided by new era technological methods to make learning more engaging, interesting and reliable. In the post accreditation period, institution has taken innovative steps such as slow/advance learners test, the quiz on general knowledge and on the subject etc. The academic performance in the previous examinations is a good indicator to identify the slow and advanced learners.

Slow Learners:

The special programme is implemented in those subjects that are considered to be difficult for an average student. As per general observation, the subjects such as English, Physics & Mathematics have been recommended for the remedial teaching at successive level of the degree course. E-links are also suggested to the students to help them to gain an in-depth knowledge of the subject. Personal, academic and career-related counseling is given from time to time. Home assignments are given and evaluated on a regular basis. Additional tests are conducted outside the curriculum to assess the learning ability of the students. Peer learning is encouraged through group discussions and presentations. Extra coaching and individual guidance is provided by the subject teachers and also activity of solving question papers of previous University Examination is done. The performance of these academic activities of students is communicated to their parents.

Advanced Learners:

During lectures, tutorials, class tests, assignments and interaction outside the class, the teachers are able to assess the caliber of the students and identify the advanced learners. Departments, through a combination of academic and co-curricular activities encourage the advanced learners to optimize their potential. Such students are encouraged to participate in intercollegiate competitions. They are suggested advanced readings in the relevant topics to enhance their understanding of the subject to enable them to pursue research in future. They are encouraged to help and provide support to the weaker students by engaging in group discussions and presentations. The opportunities are given to the students for teaching in the class as well as making individual presentations. Students are involved in special projects like analysis of current issues of relevance to their subjects. The institution encourages them to participate in 'Avishkar' an innovative research activity of the affiliated university and Govt. of Maharashtra.

Execution of the programme:

As per the guidelines of IQAC, the concerned department has developed the following strategies to conduct the programme.

- Preparing the list of difficult units and concepts from the university syllabus.
- Preparing duration and time-table of the teaching.
- Arranging some guest lecturers for the students.
- Conducting examinations, unit tests, class tests, tutorials, home assignments etc.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The student-centric method of teaching is the most authentic and convincing pedagogy followed by the faculties. Accordingly, faculty members are very much aware of the student's educational background, which leads to the proper assessment of the students. The institution acquires several measures to empower and enable the students to flourish, resulting in improved academic knowledge and skills.

In order to give autonomy to learners, focus is given for acquiring life skills and practices which enable lifelong learning, develop independent problem solving abilities. Such student centric methodologies are adopted by the institution to provide enhanced learning abilities to the students. Lecture method is effectively implemented with the use of LCD and e- resources. Demonstration method is followed for practical courses. Subject related home assignments and tutorials are given. Activities like students' seminar, MCQ's discussion, preparing wallpapers, charts, models, poster presentations, group discussions, workshops, study circles, projects, yoga practices are conducted.

To develop a new ways of thinking, learning resources like educational CDs, NPTEL videos are provided which strengthen the experiential and participative learning. Participation in essay writing, language drilling and recitation, quiz competitions, poster presentation, wall magazine, drama, debate, theme based Rangoli and elocution competitions where learners acquire knowledge through collaborative and participative activities and develop their interpersonal skills.

Some students participate in research projects/experiment under University Research Festival 'Avishkar'. For UG, project assignment and for PG, the projects are compulsory. Due to this experiential learning competency level of students is enhanced admirably.

Physical education department organizes different sports events and guides the students accordingly. Significant numbers of students have been getting mementos, medals and prizes in sports events at national, state, university, intercollegiate and college level.

Rallies and street plays organized on different occasions to contribute to experiential learning of students about social awareness. Hands-on-training programmes and certificate courses, visits to various laboratories, industries, research centers as well as laboratory work, viva-voce are arranged regularly. Students' interactions with resource persons, organization of workshops, seminars on different themes, field visits, study tours and use of language laboratory provide an academic experiential learning. Students also participate in NSS, annual gathering, youth festival, skill development programme and personality development programme etc. We arrange invited talks on social current issues. Problem solving sessions are arranged after completion of each topic so as to enhance the participative learning's and problems are given to students for experiential learning's. Short-duration certificate courses, bridge courses are conducted. The Entrepreneurship, Vision for Career workshops provides the platform to develop entrepreneurial ideas.

The departments conduct several student centric activities. The students are also encouraged to participate in different seminars and other activities. Our institution is ornamented with a good library containing journals, magazines, novels and books to ensure the benefits of reading. Free internet access is made available to the students to familiarize themselves with ICT learning and make them update for learning.

In the present era, science and technology plays a vital role in the education system. There are endless possibilities with the integration of ICT in the education system. ICT helps tremendously in developing quality education and personality of students. So, there can be a strong move towards ICT by motivating all individuals connected with education. It helps to stimulate, motivate and engaged learners in the assigned task. Teacher uses innovative methods to arouse interest and enthusiasm of the learners to optimize their abilities.

Students can learn more modern methods of teaching. They work on various projects and assignments. It also helps in providing teaching contents, homework etc. With the use of power point presentations teachers make the students to understand complex processes and theories. Students learn various languages skills. Teachers of the institution try to make the best use of the technology in their teaching-learning process. The teachers have used Google Classroom, Google Meet, Google Forms, Big Blue Button, Zoom, Moodle, etc. as an effective tool for teaching- learning and evaluation process. The institution has a Wi-Fi enabled campus which helps the teachers and students to stay connected to the internet to learn the updated information. The institution has ICT enabled classrooms having Desktops, Laptops and Projectors which helps in the e-learning process. Some teachers use and share E-books which

are very much useful for the students as they are handy and save the cost of buying the physical books.

The institution issued separate PC to each department with the printer. The institution is well equipped with computer facilities. Further, it has computer lab and language lab with internal LAN. Broadband Leased Line Internet connection is highly useful for the functions of all the above devices very smoothly and speedily. All Staff is well familiar with all the latest ICT tools. To strengthen their knowledge, institution has conducted workshop on 'Moodle', 'Google Classroom' and 'Virtual Laboratory Concept'. Network Resource Center with computers is made available for the students and teachers. Currently, teachers have been conducting online lectures and examinations.

Language lab is very useful and supportive to our students for enhancing the communication skills and soft skills. Similarly, Commerce, Social Science and Departments of Humanities effectively mix up the theoretical classroom teaching and practical exposure through the YouTube, Videos. Some of the teachers have appeared for the NPTEL/SWAYAM courses and some of the teachers have successfully completed such courses.

To keep our students and teachers in pace with the changing scenario, library is regularly updated with online resources, INFLIBNET/N-List membership is regularly upgraded and open access e-resource link are provided through institution website. The institution has an Automated Library which enables the students to find the location of the books easily. The recorded video lectures of teachers are uploaded on YouTube channel of the institution. Social media is skillfully used by the institution through WhatsApp, Testmoz etc. The institution encourages teachers to attend training programmes, workshops, seminars and conferences related to the ICT use or innovation in teaching-learning.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Institution adheres to the syllabus prescribed by the Parent University. We follow the guidelines laid down by UGC and the University to carry out a continuous internal evaluation system at institution level. This allows the students to ensure the timely understanding of each concept. Teachers ensure that the students are aware of the Internal Assessment Evaluation Criteria. It is discussed with them in detail to enhance transparency and rigor with a view to focus on individual. At the beginning of each semester, the students are given the syllabus in detail by discussing its scope and limitations. A detailed discussion about the topic is being done to clear understanding of what is expected. After teaching the syllabus topic in detail, students are informed about the unit tests through a notice well in advance. The objective type questions (MCQ's) raised in the class that help the students to increase their knowledge of the subject. The questions are mapped with course outcomes. In addition to unit tests, home assignments and mid-term examinations are conducted as a part of internal assessment. All the schedule of internal assessment is prepared and conveyed by the examination-in-charge of the concerned faculty which is to be followed strictly. Outcome of internal assessment allows the teachers to continuously assess the students to track their progress and identify slow and advanced learners. Evaluation is done both in theory and practical examinations. The assessment remains transparent, impartial and accurate. The institution collects feedback from students to know their view points and suggestions for improvement. Recently, the Google Classroom and WhatsApp have been introduced by some departments to share all important information. The study material and questions related to subject are posted on Google classroom for students. Students' can ask their queries on this platform which are promptly answered by the faculties. Moreover, as a part of internal assessment prescribed by the parent university, all departments have made compulsion to students to participate in various activities like seminars, workshops, study tours, viva-voce, interview, field visits etc. The students' laboratory performance is examined by conducting internal laboratory tests. Before the commencement of the university examination, preparatory examinations and question paper solving sessions are conducted to boost the students' confidence and time management. During regular practical's the students are also prepared and asked for the oral examinations, and the practical journals of students are assessed regularly by the teachers. For some subjects, students undertake the projects and the progress of the students are evaluated by mentors regularly. Students get a chance to improve themselves through this continuous evaluation system before appearing for the university examinations. Dates of the University examinations are displayed on the notice board well in advance. To conduct the University examinations in fair atmosphere, the internal squad takes ample efforts. University results of our students clearly indicate that the course and programme outcomes have been achieved. Some students of institution secure their position

in the University merit list. University results are the outcome of our excellent continuous assessment and evaluation system.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Institution strictly follows guidelines set by the University for the conduct of examinations. At the end of each semester, final examination is uniformly conducted for students across all the constituent institutes of S.G.B. Amravati University. The final examination of each paper has 80% weightage for overall assessment and the remaining 20% is for internal assessment. For lab course continuous assessment of every experiment is prepared by concern faculty member followed by viva voce and lab record. The internal assessment forms a part of a continuous internal evaluation (CIE) conducted through Class Tests, Tutorials, Assignments, Projects, Viva-voce, Seminars, Interviews and Presentations etc. All of these together constitute an integral part of Internal/External Examination which is carried out in a well-planned and systematic manner. Institution has a well-defined system to deal with examination related grievances. For this, there is a separate mechanism, as per the University direction, a faculty member of institution is appointed as an 'Examination Coordinator'. Examination related grievances of the students are either at the institutional or at the University level. The institutional level grievances are redressed by the Internal Examination Committee, concerned heads of the departments.

The evaluated papers of internal examinations are returned to students with suggestive remarks for improvement. Any query of students regarding the feedback and evaluation is thoroughly addressed by the respective teachers. The list of the absent students is displayed on the notice board by the concerned departments. If any student is unable to appear for the internal examination due to co-curricular, extra-curricular activities or some genuine reason, examination is conducted for them. After the evaluation of the answer books, marks are displayed on the notice board. If there is any grievance regarding the internal examinations, it is redressed efficiently in time.

The schedule of the University Examinations is displayed well in advance on the University website as well as on the notice board of the institution. For complete transparency, University assigned a '**Co-officer In-charge**' from other institution to conduct theory examination and 'External Examiner' for practical examination, under supervision of the Principal. University examination result may be challenged by the students for scrutiny/re-evaluation. Students having doubts in marks can apply for retotaling as well as for revaluation within stipulated time after the declaration of result. This whole process is conducted in such a way so as the student gets updated result within the same semester; hence it is a time-bound process. Further, it is also efficient as its being done with honesty.

At the time of theory examinations, grievances regarding the online question papers are considered and redressed with the help of Controller of Examination, of Sant Gadage Baba Amravati University, Amravati. For practical examinations, the out of turn facility is provided to students who remain absent for

the examination due to genuine reasons.



Thus, there is an effective and efficient grievance redressal mechanism for internal/external examination. If any error is detected in the final mark-sheet in spite of rigorous scrutiny, it is promptly reported to the University by the institution.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

The Board of Studies of respective subjects, while prescribing the syllabi, design the POs, PSOs, and COs. The purpose behind communicating these POs, PSOs and COs to the teachers is to convey teachers what knowledge and skills are expected to impart to students. The same is conveyed to students so that they should know what they are expected to learn.

The institute aims to help students to reach their potential through the provision of a supportive, participative, vibrant and challenging learning environment. Faculties show active involvement in creating the learning environment. The curriculum of teaching-learning is student-centric, and all the students evaluated equally during their academic journey.

Students' learning outcomes are monitored based on unit tests, assignments, practical examinations, project work, viva- voce, interview seminars, and presentations etc.

All the activities mentioned earlier are evaluated in a concise duration and the marks/grades are recorded correspondingly, which acts as a ready reckoner for the student's academic progress. Compulsory attendance, participation in the classroom events, marks scored in assignments, seminars, group discussions, helps the faculties to judge the students properly. Counseling sessions are organized mainly for slow and advanced learners. The faculty members follow instructions regarding the teaching-learning process so that the institutional objectives should be achieved.

The students acquire the scientific knowledge and core principles of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, and Computer Science in day to day life.

Course outcome of languages used to understand basics concepts in linguistics (Marathi, English and Urdu), gain the knowledge of parts of speech, vocabulary, identify the themes of lesson, summarize poem, the reporting of any incident, function, official letters, Muslim education, social condition of Indian women, history of Marathi, Persian and Urdu literature, sources of ancient Iran, Iran before and after Islam, Aariyans in Iran, ancient Iranian languages, style of Persian poetry, classical Persian literature, modern Persian literature, basic of Persian language, forms of Persian poetry.

The Social Science students get acquainted with the political ideas, ideologies, policies, processes and behavior as well as groups, classes, government, diplomacy, law, strategy, role of balanced diet for various stages, malnutrition, ability to explain economic terms, concept and theories, social problem, social and religious movement, ancient, middle and modern History of India and World.

The commerce course familiarizes the students with business economics, micro and macro- economics, utility approach and elasticity of demand, market, cost and revenue, business and managerial economics, factors pricing, information technology & business data processing, tax and audit system in India.

The institution deputed teachers for orientation course, refresher course, induction course, short term course, workshops, seminars, conferences and FDPs to enrich them to attain the outcomes during teaching-learning process. Teachers actively participate in workshops on revision of syllabus organized by the University as well as Teachers' Association. Many teachers are also the members of syllabus sub committees. Alumni share their individual experiences that how programme/course shaped their career, which helps existing students to align better with the specified programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes and course outcomes.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The attainment of programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes and course outcomes are the foundation on which any higher educational institution grows. Therefore, it is very essential to take a review of the accomplishment of POs, PSOs, and COs incessantly. In order to evaluate the attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs, the formative and summative evaluation methods have been used. The formative evaluation system is a part of CIE through which students are evaluated continuously to see whether the programme / course outcomes are attained or not. The formative evaluation system comprises unit tests, midterm examinations, home assignments, study tours, student seminars, field projects, interview, viva-voce, workshops, text book reading, industrial visits etc.

The summative evaluation system comprises of semester wise examinations, conducted by the university with the help of institution, at the end of each semester. The University assessment consists of eighty marks for each paper and twenty marks for internal assessment. Science faculty students are assessed based on the performance in the practical examinations as well as written examinations conducted by the University.

The evaluation system and students feedback result in the course objectives', fulfillment through the proper channel to the students. Class tests, unit tests, assignments, practical's, seminars, projects, presentations, viva-voce are executed to overcome the difficulties in the relevant subject. Learning process is an integrated and exciting process based on classroom activities such as regular seminars, debates, group discussions on the relevant subjects. Activities like wallpaper, poster making, project work, charts and model presentations are organized by various departments. This helps to appreciate and motivate the students to perform and aim higher in their subjects. Extension activities such as awareness rallies, cleanliness campaigns, blood donation camps and such other activities enable the students to think out of the frame and be creative, proactive and inculcate the values of ethics. Many students have participated in academic events, cultural events and sports competitions at the university/state/ intercollegiate level to amplify the attainment as an outcome.

After measuring attainment of POs, PSOs and COs, it has been observed that the strength of the students as well as passing percentage of the students has been increasing progressively. Besides, students' progression to the higher studies is increasing consistently and rapidly in the last five years. We take utmost care of measuring the level of attainment of POs, PSOs and COs and followed formal as well as informal mechanism, for the measurement of attainment of the outcomes. Even we take feedback from all the stakeholders in this respect and try to take necessary action accordingly.

The overall result of institution, for the academic year 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 is that some of our

students have secured place in the merit lists of the University. Taking into account the performance of students in the university examinations, employment through placement camps and students opting for higher education, it can be said that the POs, PSOs, and COs are achieved successfully. The result analysis and attainment of programmes outcome is discussed in the IQAC meeting.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response

The institution has created an ecosystem for innovation including Research Promotion Cell, Incubation center, Student Development Cell and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge.

Research Promotion Cell (RPC)-

Institution has constituted Research Promotion Cell to promote and monitor research activities. The cell encourages and motivates researchers and faculty members to participate and publish their research papers in National/ International conferences as well as in the journals with good impact factors. During the last five years, total **88 papers** have been published by the faculties in the UGC listed Journals and **155 papers** in International/National conferences and in reputed journals with ISSN/ISBN as well as chapters in books. Institution avails IT resources to the researcher, students and faculty members.

The RPC also motivates the teachers to organize conferences, workshops, seminars, symposia etc. to provide opportunities for research. In January 2020, one Day Interdisciplinary National level conference on '**Recent Trends & Issues in Humanities**' (NCRTIH) by the Departments of Humanities, in July 2020, One Day interdisciplinary National Webinar on Post COVID-19 'Challenges and Opportunities in Higher Education' by Department of Commerce and Political Science, in December 2020, '**International Virtual conference on Drug, Disease And Development**' by the Department of Chemistry and in August 2021 Six days National Level Online FDP on '**Revised Assessment & Accreditation Framework**' were organized in collaboration with IQAC.

To develop the research culture and aptitude among students, each faculty continuously encourages the students for research and provides related reading materials, periodicals and journals. Institution is also recognized as Research center for **Marathi, English, Political Science** and **Mathematics**. Students are

induced to take an active participation in research based activities. Institution as well as students has received awards for their participation and great achievement in the 'Gandhi Vichar Sanskar Examination' conducted by Gandhi Research Foundation Jalgaon. Some students of the college were awarded by **Gold, Silver** and **Bronze medals** and appreciation certificates for acquiring **1st, 2nd and 3rd Rank**.

Incubation center-

The institution has established incubation center to meet social needs as and when addressed through innovation and research projects. It helps both faculty and students to understand the concept of Intellectual Property Rights, Patentable Research & Skill based training programmes for lifelong learning. Under the incubation center, various innovative activities such as 'Stall Management and Marketing', 'Self-Manufacturing and Selling' are being organized. Some ex-students of the institution are permitted to fill up 'Online Admission and Scholarship Forms' as an initiative towards 'Self Employment'. Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

Response:

The institution has excellent infrastructural facilities such as spacious classrooms, laboratories, seminar hall, library, reading room, administrative office, playgrounds, girl's common room etc. College constantly provides quality education for all round development of the students so as to make them aware and responsible human.

The institution is situated in rural area of Yavatmal district having an aesthetic landscape of 28327.995 sq. meters (Seven Acres) and built up area is 4376.09 sq. meters. The institution has a well maintained, user friendly and resilient infrastructure conducive to teaching, learning and comprehensive development of students. In the beginning of the every academic session, need assessment for replacement/ up- gradation/ renovation of the existing infrastructure is carried out by the committees. The institution provides eco-friendly environment, landscaping with trees and plants. It has thirty classrooms, Six laboratories, a library, an administrative office, an air conditioned office of principal and guest, a seminar hall with LCD projector, IQAC office, staff room, a Computer and English Language Lab with thirty computers, a separate common room for girls and boys, a dark room and a canteen.

Classrooms:

Classrooms are spacious with sufficient lighting, ventilation and black- green boards. Nine classrooms are equipped with LCD projector.

The institution has established systems and procedure for meticulous maintenance and upkeep of various facilities. The quality of facilities has an impact on educational outcomes and well-being of students and teachers. Sufficient fund is allocated for the maintenance of the physical, academic and support facilities. Maintenance is outsourced to appropriate and reliable agencies. As per the requirement, furniture, books, stationary, equipment etc. are purchased on regular basis under the recommendations of purchase committee consisting of the Principal. Regular purchase of tools/wares for maintenance of institution's infrastructure is done by conducting regular meetings. Software's are continuously upgraded to ensure the market relevance of acquired skills.

Maintenance of the campus:

Physical infrastructure of the institution is oversees by the campus maintenance committee. The maintenance committee takes care of buildings, electrical systems, plumbing, cleaning, carpentry and of the gardening also. Classrooms, library, administrative office, laboratories, staff room, all campus area, pathways are cleaned and maintained regularly by the temporary supporting staff. Major maintenance, renovation and repairing of building are outsourced. Solid, liquid and waste management disposal systems are available in the college. Rain water harvesting unit is regularly checked. Colored dustbins are availed with distinction for segregation of campus waste; under the green campus. Water purifiers are installed and its maintenance is carried out by a technician. Biometric system is installed for the attendance of the employees. CCTV cameras are installed in various places to keep constant eyes on the campus events. The security guards are employed to remark entry and exit of the stakeholders. Some of them deploy their duties at parking station.

Classrooms:

Every year, before the commencement of the semester, furniture in classrooms are repaired or replaced as per need. Lights, fans and the ICT tools are checked and maintained in working condition. Institution provides the classrooms, seminar hall to the government and private agencies to organize their official activities like competitive examinations, meetings, seminars, camps, trainings, exhibition etc.

Laboratories:

As per the academic need of the stakeholders, laboratories are fully equipped. New equipment are purchased and damaged are replaced. The laboratory attendants and assistants regularly checks whether all things are in sooth condition or not. The fire extinguishers are available in all laboratories and at other major places. Electrical equipment, circuits and other supporting devices etc. are checked and repaired as per need.

Library:

The librarian and the attendants take care of the library. The library Advisory Committee meets regularly for funding and purchasing of books for the year. Accession Register, Stock Register and Back Volumes are maintained. Before the commencement of every academic session, librarian collects the list of required books from the teachers and placed demand before the principal to purchase. After the approval, librarian purchases the books from reliable vendors. The books are protected from the insects using naphthalene balls. The stock verification is carried out by the committee formed by the Principal. Damaged books are sent every year for binding, to keep them in good condition.

IT Infrastructure

Institution continuously strives to provide latest technologies and update its ICT facilities to ensure efficient functioning. Separate internet connections. The institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi – Fi. It is maintained by the outsource technician as and when required.

Generator maintenance:

The generator is maintained regularly by the supporting staff to keep it in working condition.

Computer Services:

The honorary technicians take care of hardware problems. Required software packages are purchased to meet out the current academic needs. The laboratory assistants monitor all computer services.

Canteen

The canteen is restructured into an open-kitchen canteen. The refreshment are prepared and served hygienically by the owner who wears aprons, head covers, service hand gloves etc. Separate compartments are made for Staff, Boys and Girls students. Cleanliness and infrastructure of the canteen are well maintained by the owner. Potable water facility is provided for all.

Parking

Institution has constructed parking shed for staff's bikes and cars. Open air separate parking for boys and girls is availed in the campus.

Garden and Botanical Garden

The institution is situated by the site of well-constructed state highway on beautiful semi-hill top. Naturally the institution has got appreciable look. In the front of administrative office small but an attractive garden has been developed. A small temple of deity of Shri. Mungasaji Maharaj is constructed in

the campus. Apart from this a statue of great Maratha Emperor Shri. Chatrapati Shivaji Maharaj and a great freedom fighter Shri. Subhash Chandra Bose have also erected. The statues of the saint and revolutionary reformer always give constant inspiration to all of us. Beautiful pathways with landscaping of trees enhanced the beauty of the garden. In the garden some age-longed trees, some medicinal and show plants are planted from hygienic and environmental point of view by keeping in mind the quality of rocky soil. Some relaxing chairs have been put in the garden for recreation and comfortable.

Rain Water Harvesting

Because of scarcity of water, rain water harvesting was much essential and burning issue to think off seriously, so rain water harvesting is installed in the campus. Rainwater harvesting is a simple technique of catching and preserving rainwater where its falls. Therefore, tanks are constructed for directing rain water into a large storage tank in front of institution. Rain water harvesting helps to prevent soil erosion and meet the water requirements partially. Institution has been utilizing rain water harvesting technology to collect, convey and store rain water to recharge groundwater level. **Solar Power Plant**

It is the need of the century to use the renewable energy sources such as solar energy as a traditional energy sources are depleting very fast. Therefore Solar Power Plant system is installed which generates around 8kW energy. It helps the institute not only to back up but also electricity.

A student of each class having highest marks in the previous qualifying examination becomes the member of 'Students' Council' by default after the completion of admission procedure especially in month of August of every year. The 'Women Development Cell', 'Games and Sports Unit', 'Cultural Unit' and 'N.S.S. Unit' recommend names of their units to the Principal to approve their representation on 'Students' Council'.

From among all the members of 'Students' Council', a University Representative (U.R.) has to be elected through preferential voting in fair and impartial atmosphere. But due to spread of Covid-19, no such process could be carried out. The 'Students Council Committee' used to arrange first welcome meeting of the members generally in the first week of September of each year, followed by election of a University Representative. The 'Students' Council Committee' publishes notification regarding the representation of students' council members on various committees and bodies of the institution with prior permission of head of the institution. The 'Students' Council Committee' arranges their meetings at regular intervals to accept and discuss their suggestions, queries, problems and difficulties. The elected university representative (U.R.) works as secretary of the 'Students' Council' and the rest works as members and help to carry out curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Decentralization and participative management of the institution is visible in all its academic and administrative spheres. Multi-layered transparent governance system is ensured through written policies, systems and procedures, distinct job descriptions and well-knit committees, and accountability is ensured through consultation, evaluation and follow ups. In accordance with the policy of decentralization adopted by the management, both teaching and non- teaching members are adequately represented on CDC/LMC and their opinions are sought in making and implementation of different policies. Apart from this, various committees at institutional level work under the IQAC. The IQAC holds its meeting at regular intervals wherein various decisions related to curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are taken. The IQAC chalks out its extensive and all inclusive plan eyeing on the academic calendar provided by the Parent University. It includes the academic calendar, teaching plan, tentative schedule of examinations to be held at institutional level, functioning of various committees, proposals to be submitted for the introduction of new courses. Thereafter, the IQAC holds their meetings to discuss aforementioned issues and certain decisions are taken. Accordingly all the decisions of the IQAC are circulated to the concerning departments and committees. Proposals under various schemes to be submitted to UGC and other funding agencies for organizing seminars, workshops, conferences etc. Various committees and departments chalk out their departmental plans and committees too, to do the same. As per the instructions given by the IQAC functioning of all the organs of the institution is carried out. It discusses all the issues pertaining to teaching learning process. It is observed that the affiliating university makes changes in the syllabi of various subjects and the notifications of the same are circulated to affiliated colleges.

The ‘College Development Committee’ is the backbone of the institution. Therefore, institution has formed ‘College Development Committee’ (C.D.C.), as per the Maharashtra Universities Act – 2016, to carry out all the development related activities. In this committee, possible representation is given to all the stakeholders of the institution. At regular intervals it holds its meeting and takes review of an overall development of the institution. It also discusses the prospective plan of the development of the institution. Due representation has been given to the students through the platform of ‘Student Council’. Almost all the curriculum related activities/committees find students’ representations adequately.

All the teachers of the institution find their due representations on various committees. The prospectus of the institution clearly reflects the decentralization and participative management of the institution. The ‘Staff Council’ is chaired by the Principal and recommends a teacher as secretary of the staff council.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response

The organogram of the institution reflects the democratic character and shared responsibilities through good governance mechanism. The overall supervision of administration and the regulation of finances of the institution rest with the Governing Body, whose authority is vested in it by the statutes and ordinances of the Parent University. The administration and execution of everyday functions lies in the charge of the Principal. The functions of the Principal in turn are supported by the faculty and the non-teaching staff. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell also assists the Principal in ensuring a quality teaching and learning environment in the institution.

The Governing Body under the leadership of the Chairperson gives directions to the administration and decision-making, finances and regulation, purchases, overall development and quality assurance of the institution. It also appoints the Vice Principal and the Bursar in its capacity upon recommendation by the Principal. The Principal, as the chief administrator of the institution, supervises and manages the overall functioning of the institution. The CDC administers decisions regarding maintenance, admissions, discipline and codes of conduct, curricular and extracurricular aspects of the institution, subject to the provisions and ordinances of the UGC and the Parent University. The teachers-in-charge work in collaboration with the Principal and the irrespective departments in accomplishing the academic, financial and co-curricular requirements of the departments.

The Bursar manages the matters related to internal finances and financial audit of the institution. He also ensures effective utilization of funds available for institutional purposes. Financial decisions are taken by the Principal and Bursar in consultation with the Governing Body.

Librarian supervises the library with assistance of the clerk and attendants in maintaining the upkeep of the library. The librarian also works with the **Library Advisory Committee** in upgrading the academic resources and facilities.

The first appellate authority in the institution is the Principal, who precedes the PIO (Public Information Officer). The PIO addresses requests from persons seeking information (in the form of RTIs) from the institution. The IQAC of the institution plays a key role in assessing and assuring quality in the teaching-learning and evaluation process. The IQAC conducts the bi-annual internal academic and administrative audit of departments and physical verification of laboratories to monitor and ensure quality in the institution. Various skill-based and quality events are also conducted by the institution under the aegis of IQAC.

The Administrative Staff of the institution is characterized by a well-defined organizational structure, with positions according to the University rules and the UGC. The administrative decisions are implemented by the Principal, who is assisted by a team of office staff. The concerned committees supervise the maintenance and smooth working of the infrastructure by means of staff, electricians, gardeners, watchman etc.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Response

Since the inception of the institution number of teaching, non-teaching and casual workers have been rendering their services. They may come across various kinds of hurdles in their lives. Therefore, it was necessary to introduce few schemes for their welfare either it may be at government level or institution level. Keeping all these circumstances in mind not only the state government but also the institution itself takes an initiative for the said purpose. The institution has effective welfare measures and recognizes all its employees as the most valuable resources. It provides caring and supportive working environment to all the staff which enables them to develop and optimize their full potential. However, members of staff are obligated to contribute and participate effectively in achieving institution's Mission and Vision.

The institution has various effective welfare measures and facilities for teaching and non-teaching staff, some of them are as under

1. Group life insurance for teaching and non-teaching staff.
2. Loan without interest from provident fund for permanent employees.

3. Proper disbursement of government welfare schemes to the employees.
4. Medical reimbursement.
5. Teachers are honored and felicitated for their academic excellence such as completing Ph. D. degrees and holding various positions in the academic bodies at University level.
6. Availability of Grievance Redressal Cell functioning for teaching and non-teaching staff.

Various types of leaves are available as per rules of University and state Government norms-

Casual Leave :-

A member of the staff on casual leave is not treated as an absent from duty and his pay is not interrupted. The maximum numbers of casual leaves in a calendar year are 8. Casual leave cannot be combined with any other kind of leave.

Earned Leaves:-

The teaching staff of the institution is eligible for annual leave / earned leave. The earned leaves can be availed during the academic period as applicable without causing any academic disturbance and should be recommended by HOD.

Study Leave:-

The teaching staff of institution may be granted leave for advancement of their education in India or abroad under specified terms and conditions.

Higher educational programmes need to be completed in stipulated time of two or three years.

Medical/Sick leave:-

Ten days special leave can be granted / availed in case of accident, hospitalization or getting operated due to serious illness of employee. This leave can be availed only on medical grounds i.e. hospitalization or serious illness for more than three days. Proper documentary evidence is required to avail this leave.

Maternity Leave/ Paternity Leave

Women employees of institution except those on casual basis may be granted maternity leave for a period of 6 months. Leave application is to be supported by a certificate of a Civil Surgeon (M.B.B.S./ M.D.). Male staff members are eligible for 15 days paid paternity leave.

Faculty Improvement Programmes (FIP)

Staff is encouraged to attend conferences / workshops / Faculty Development Programmes and Training Programmes, for this special leave is granted as per University rules and regulations.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response

The Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff provides an insight into one's own assessment of effectiveness of teaching and administrative style and its impact on the students.

The institution has Performance Appraisal System used for teaching staffs following UGC regulations 2010 with the amendments in regular intervals. Candidates may appeal themselves for assessment for promotion, if they fulfill the minimum API scores indicated in the appropriate API system.

The Institution regularly assesses the performances of its staff by the following methods:

1. Performance appraisal by the Principal
2. Performance appraisal by the HOD'S
3. Submission of self-appraisal report by the faculty

Performance appraisal system for teaching and non-teaching staff:

The appraisal forms are filled by all teaching staff at the end of every academic year. PAS format is

common for teaching staff for the promotion from assistant professor to professor. The performance of each employee is assessed annually. The objective is not only to evaluate the performance as per established norms, but also to identify potential aspects for improvement that can eventually lead to further progress and growth of the employee. The salient features of the performance appraisal system are as follows:

Teaching Staff

- a) The performance of each faculty member is assessed according to the Annual Self-Assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS).
- b) Promotions are based on the PBAS proforma for UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) that is based on the API score.
- c) The institute undertakes a wide range of activities besides academics, for which faculty members are assigned additional duties and responsibilities, which are mostly voluntary. The institute accords appropriate weightage of their contributions of their overall assessment.
- d) The faculty members are informed well in advance about their due promotion.
- e) The PBAS proforma filled by the faculty member is checked and verified by the Heads of the Departments, followed by the concerning committee and IQAC coordinator.
- f) The proposals of the faculty members, whose promotions are due, are recommended to appear before the screening-cum-selection committee.

For Non-Teaching staff

UGC regulated Career Advancement Scheme is not applicable for non-teaching staff. They are subject promote in their respective fields after a period of service not less than prescribed by the state government or it depend on the length of service. All non-teaching staff is also assessed through annual confidential reports and annual performance appraisal. The various parameters for staff members are assessed under different categories i.e. Character and Habits, Departmental Abilities, Capacity to do hard work, Discipline, Reliability, Relations/Co-operation with superiors, subordinates, colleagues, students and public, Power of Drafting (where applicable), efficient organization of documents (in case of Ministerial Staff) and technical abilities (in case of workshop staff). The overall assessment is based on the cumulative grade by the Reporting Officer/HOD, which is then forwarded to the Principal. The Annual Confidential Report and the Performance Appraisal System has significantly helped in the evaluation of the performance of employees, in motivating them, analyzing their strengths and weaknesses and ensuring better performance.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Institution conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis.

Mechanism for Internal Audit and External Audit is as follows

The institution has a mechanism for both internal and external audit. The administrative office keeps all the financial records separately as per the events and transactions made for. The competent auditor has been appointed by the Governing Body for internal audit. Throughout every academic year, the institution has to go through various financial activities. It needs to maintain the account of its expenditure for the final financial audit of the institution. Institution maintains annual account of the expenditure and at the end of the every financial year; the audited statement is authenticated by the licensed C.A.

Internal Audit:

- Internal audit is a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction,
- Principal and Office Superintendent scrutinize different financial heads for clarity, authenticity, transparency and financial accuracy.
- Income/Expenditure is closely monitored by the Office Superintendent and the Principal. The institution is liberal, yet follows the strategy of restraint as far as the expenditure is concerned.
- Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations from the Librarian, Physical Director and heads of the various departments are called for and prices are compared.
- The audit wing of the Joint Director Office visits the institution periodically and inspects all the files pertaining to the financial matters that the institution has availed of and all the receipts and payments.
- They, in turn, submit the audit report to the institution authorities.
- Corrections are effected on the basis of the audit report and clarifications called by them are submitted as an audit reply.
- For the grants received from the UGC, utilization certificates are prepared according to the allowed expenditure under various heads.
- The Utilization Grant Certificates are annually submitted to UGC.

Beside this, the institution has to undergo the external / statutory audit. It is carried out by a Government auditor appointed by the Joint Director of Higher Education, Government of Maharashtra.

External Audit:

- The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an auditor is appointed by the institution.
- The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked. The vouchers and proper record with the concerned Department of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified.
- Departmental Accession Register, Dead Stock Registers/Purchase, Registers are physically

checked.

- The Utilization Grant Certificates are also audited by the external auditor.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

Response

The institution mobilizes funds for its regular activities and development from different agencies and individuals. The mobilized fund is optimally used by the institution. IQAC plays a key role in mobilizing the financial resources efficiently. It identifies the programmes and the funding source and plans accordingly.

IQAC assesses the area for fund utilization based on the research policy, quality policy and strategic plans of the institution and gives recommendations to the CDC. Besides this, IQAC is vigilant on the announcement of different government funding agencies, regarding their schemes and educates and equips the faculty to proceed for specific funding in research and development.

The institution has a well-defined mechanism for proper mobilization of funds that ensures transparency and the best use of it.

The Government funds are received from University Grants Commission (UGC) and Department of Science and Technology (DST), Maharashtra State Higher Education Council.

Another infrastructural development funds received from MP`s and MLA`s.

The Non-Government funds received from management for utilization on developmental and departmental activities.

The institution sends proposals for additional grants to the University Grants Commission (UGC) in order to meet expenses for construction, repair and renovation of the building and premises. It moderates student`s fee structure every year in order to procure additional funding. Alumni Association has raised some funds for the same.

UGC has sanctioned **one Crore** for the construction of Multi-purpose Gymnasium Hall.

Utilization of Resources

- The institution has a Governing Body, CDC, Planning and Purchase Committee, Library and various associated bodies which help in the preparation, division, allocation and utilization of funds.
- UGC funds are deposited in a separate account. The utilization of these funds is ensured through audit at the end of each financial year.
- Fees received from students are used for development of the institution, non-grant faculty and staff salaries are properly audited. Physical and Academic facilities are augmented as per need for students.
- Library services and Sports services are strengthened. Laboratories are augmented and IT infrastructure is increased.
- Good number of conferences, seminars and workshops has been organized at National and International levels. Similarly Academic Guidance Talk, field trips, industrial visits, excursion tours have been organized.
- The Purchase Committee decides the policy and procedure for purchasing any article and purchased by comparing a minimum of three quotations received from different vendors.
- All purchases are done through a tender system. Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers.
- All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring are incurred through Cheques/Electronic mode. Only authorized persons by management can operate the transaction through the bank.
- The accounts are done by Tally Software, so all the entries can be monitored by authorities.
- For each and every financial transaction proper permission is taken from the Principal.

- Attending and conducting FDP to bridge the knowledge gap of the teachers at par with the latest developments in the irrespective disciplines.
- Organizing interdisciplinary National and International level Conferences, Seminars, Workshops and Symposium on various subjects enveloping abroad range of themes/sub themes relevant to modern day education in HEIs.
- Encouraging teachers to apply for funding to various research organizations like NAAC, UGC, DST etc. to undertake research projects.
- IQAC organizes IPR workshop and FDP to aware and motivate students and teachers.
- ICT workshops to enable teachers to intersperse technology in curriculum to make the art of classroom pedagogy more relevant and interesting for students.

- Teachers, who have completed their Ph.D. degrees, are felicitated by the Teachers' Council & the Governing Body of the institution.
- The teachers are motivated to publish research papers in UGC care listed journals, reputed Journals and in proceeding of the conferences.

Streamlining of Administrative Practices

IQAC takes care of the needs of the administrative staff to improve their work atmosphere, both at the professional and emotional fronts. The IQAC proposes a number of best practices in various aspects.

- IQAC believes in establishing a democratic pattern of administration. The Management along with the Principal ensures that equal opportunities are given to staff members who are best suited for a particular department and also, they are provided with opportunities to hone their skills.
- The IQAC has developed a Non-teaching Self Evaluation & Feedback Form for the personal improvement of the staff members and to take suggestions for betterment of their performance, thus providing encouragement for growth and improvement.
- Self Enhancement Workshops are organized from time to time to improve Data Management skills of the staff.

It has been one of the primary concerns of IQAC to adopt practices, which will provide quality education to the students through an effective and meaningful teaching-learning process. This plays an instrumental role in enhancing the quality of the academic and co-curricular endeavors of the institution in keeping with its vision and mission.

Incremental improvements as per the recommendations of the PEER team after first cycle are

1. Physics, Chemistry and Home Economics laboratories have been satisfactorily improved. The laboratories are adequately equipped and furnished.
2. Institution has availed a teacher Mr. Y. S. Solanke for the **Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP)** from 29/04/2013 to 09/04/2015.

3. Due to support and motivation of the institution 10 teachers have been awarded doctorate degree. Apart from this 155 research papers have been published in UGC listed journals and reputed journals, 194 research papers in conferences and 36 chapters in the books.
4. Successful efforts have been made for the recruitment of teachers. **Thirteen** full time teachers and **Ten** non-teaching staff have been recruited after first cycle.
5. Library facilities are strengthened by adding 3032 text books of Rs.494385/-, 4247 Reference Books of Rs. 1165103/-, Journals/Periodicals- 33 of Rs.96914/-e-books & e-journals of Rs. 11450/- and CD/DVD - 47 of Rs. 15043/-.
6. Institution has constituted Research Promotion Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Career Counseling Cell, Guidance Cell and Parent Council etc. It is published in the prospectus.
7. Institution has constituted Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) to meet the needs of the administrative staff to improve their work atmosphere and also to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance.

Incremental improvements as per the recommendations of the PEER team after second cycle are

1. Teacher's quality is much improved. Ten teachers have been awarded doctorate degree. Apart from this 88 research papers have been published in UGC listed journals and reputed journals, 155 research papers in conferences and 20 chapters in the books.
2. Library facilities are strengthened by adding 1839 text books of Rs.366152/-, 1652 Reference Books of Rs. 589852/-, Journals/Periodicals 15 of Rs.45512/-, e-books & e-journals of Rs. 46950/- and CD/DVD -07 of Rs. 2602/-.
3. Laboratory facilities are improved and standardized.
4. Language Laboratory is installed.
5. Institution is a local chapter of NPTEL.
6. Teaching- learning process has been supported with ICT tools.
7. More computers, internet facility, Wi-Fi and good infrastructure have been facilitated.
8. Some International, National conferences, Seminars and Workshops have been successfully organized in different disciplines.
9. Academic results are much improved, in 2019-2020, 06 students and in 2020-21- 06 students have achieved meritorious rank in Parent University Examination and result is more than 99%.
10. Spoken English classes are conducted frequently and some certificates courses are also introduced and implemented successfully.
11. Even after sanctioned by UGC and follow up by the institute, funds of two Minor Research Project for Rs. 5,90,000/- has been not released.
12. Except Covid-19 situation, every year institution has been successfully organizing **Vision for Carrier** workshop so as to provide mentoring, career guidance and coaching for the competitive examinations not only for our students but also for students of University areas.
13. IQAC has been contributing significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes at all levels. It carries out activities that encompass all aspects of the institute's functioning. It also prepares, evaluates and recommends needful suggestions for implementation to College Development Committee (CDC). For this IQAC meets regularly as per the needs and issues.

IQAC achieves this through mainly two practices, viz,

1. Feedback Mechanism

Collecting online feedback from stakeholders like students, parents, employers, staff and alumni to facilitate teaching-learning reforms. This helps in obtaining an unbiased and honest opinion about the institutional performance especially in academics. Student feedback of teachers is conducted regularly. A careful analysis of the feedback received is done and communicated to the teachers to enable them to enhance their teaching skills and their relationship with the students.

2. Attainment of Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes

- IQAC suggests innovative pedagogical methodologies like Power Point Presentations, Projects, Field Trips, Workshops, Videos etc. in addition to the completion of curriculum through Assignments, Class Tests, Seminar, Project, Tutorials etc.
- Departments are encouraged to organize Conferences and Seminars on themes relevant to current issues, educational needs and also futuristic growth of the students.
- Bonds of collaboration have been established with Colleges, NGO`s and Industry so as to provide global exposure to the students through Exchange Programmes. This helps to widen the horizons of the students, enabling them to gain in depth understanding of the course content.
- For job opportunities/placement reputed companies have been invited by Placement Cell. In 2019-20, **nine** companies conducted interviews and 287 students are selected. Apart from this, Lupin Pharmaceutical Company, Nagpur also conducted interviews and three students were selected and ICICI bank has also conducted interviews.
- IQAC tries to provide opportunities to students to keep themselves abreast of the latest trends in the various sectors viz, media, fashion designing etc. These add to the learning outcomes of the UG and PG programmes and courses being taught to the students.
- Our institution offers some dedicated certificate courses. These courses impart life skills, job oriented skills and are transacted by practitioners.

Based on the implementation of the above two practices, IQAC, post accreditation, institution is able to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to bring about reforms in teaching-learning process, structure, methodologies and learning outcomes.

Institution has adopted smart initiatives like Go Green Campus; in this regard Waste Management is helping to achieve higher level of environmental performance. It is an important element of environmental protection. Its purpose is to provide hygienic, efficient and economic solid waste storage, collection, transportation and treatment or disposal of waste without polluting the atmosphere, soil or water system. Waste management has been done by following ways.

- Minimizing the amount of waste that we generate.
- Recovering waste materials and finding ways to recycle them.

- Disposing of waste safely and effectively.

Solid Waste Management:

The waste is generated by all sorts of routine activities carried out that includes paper, plastics, glass, metals, foods etc. is segregated at each level and source. The cleaning worker in each floor collect, clean, segregate and compile the waste in the dustbins (Green and Blue) and is taken to the dumping yard. The institution has signed MOU's with authorized vendors to collect the waste, segregate, recycles and dispose it off. It continuously creates awareness among the students about solid waste management and its side effects on health and hygiene.

Liquid Waste Management:

Special care is taken for the water conservation and prevention of water wastage. For waste water, drainage canals are made available throughout the campus. The institution installed the rain water harvesting mechanism. The quality of drinking water has been checked regularly. Chemical wastes hazardous are segregated in a special pit and dispose of with care.

E-Waste Management

All the E-waste such as memory chips, motherboards, pen drives, cords and cables, batteries, compact discs, key boards, mouse, cartridges etc. generated from electronic equipment are recycled properly. UPS Batteries are recharged / repaired / exchanged by the suppliers. Instead of buying a new machine buyback option is taken for technology up gradation. The e-waste generated from hardware which cannot be reused or recycled is being disposed of through authorized vendors. MOU's with Chintamani Computers, Yavatmal has been signed for this purpose.

Rain Water Management:

For rain water harvesting, pits are constructed for percolation of rain water to prevent soil erosion and trying to maintain ground water level partially. Rainwater harvesting is a simple technique of catching and holding rainwater where it falls.

Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management:

Chemical waste and expired chemical are drained in the bund constructed at barren backside of the laboratory.

In addition to these to make campus eco-friendly, our institution tries to create environmental, climate change, rain water harvesting awareness etc. and motivating students for reuse and recycling of waste.

3) The context:- The practice relates to social issues with kindness and human features. It is being adopted as a relevant concept in the context of present society and guided by the ‘Vision and Mission’ of Institution and revised guidelines of IQAC. The main concept behind this practice is to provide timely assistance to the society as a communal harmony as well as moral obligation, especially through the students. Innumerable types of donations are there, but the value of donating blood is unparalleled. Every time, the thought of saving someone’s life, creates a kind of pity and pride in the minds of the donors. The task to be performed voluntarily with a sense of institutional social responsibility appears to be challenging in nature as it pertains to resolve day to-day problem, faced by people who are socially and economically weaker. Donating blood to needy people is a good idea. But various issues need to be addressed while designing and implementing such best practice. Though science and technology excelled in each and every sector, blood cannot be artificially manufactured and there is no substitute for it and a bottle of blood saves four lives. It is in constant demand for accident victims, hemophilic, surgeries, infants’, patients battling cancers and other diseases. In addition blood supplies need to be replenished constantly, as blood products have a short shelf life. With blood storages occurring worldwide, it is important to create a network of

young blood donors who committed to donate regularly. So blood donation is one of the active ways of helping others. Therefore, it is felt that there is need to create awareness about blood donation and provide help to the society by means of this practice.

4) The practice: - This practice has been adopted every year since 2009 and is to be followed in future also. 'Students Welfare Cell' and 'NSS Unit' in association with Vasantnao Naik Government Medical College, Yavatmal organizes Blood Donation Camps.

Under the policy, blood transfusion is available to the people, irrespective of their economic or social status. Total quality management approach has ensured smooth conduct of blood donation camps.

5) Evidence of success:- Institution has successfully implemented this practice since 2009 and onwards, With the assistance of Vasantnao Naik Government Medical College, Yavatmal. It has organized blood donation camps time to time either on birth day of the president of institution or as per scarcity and urgent need of blood. The employees and the students render their valuable services in organizing the blood donation camps. The blood donors are given needful refreshment. The Blood Bank officials give identity cards and certificates to donors through which the donors can get blood immediately and at any time in free of cost, as per his/her emergency.

The institute organized regular blood donation camps as under;

- In 2016- 2017 on 19/09/2016 (27 donors)
- In 2017-2018 on 05/03/2018 (45 donors)
- In 2018- 2019 on 05/03/2019 (84 donors)
- In 2019- 2020 on 05/03/2020 (34 donors)
- In 2020- 2021 on 20/12/2020 (27 donors) and
- In 2021- 2022 on 24/12/2021 (101 donors)

6) Problems encountered and resources required:- The infrastructure for arranging the Blood Donation Camp is available with the institution. So it does not face any major obstacle worth to mention. The hurdles faced are inadequate resources and lack of extensive awareness programmes. To remove myths and misconceptions about donating blood is a difficult task but anyhow by proper counseling, problems are overcome successfully. In addition to this, despite of many persuasions to girls, they do not come forward voluntarily to donate the blood. Even after, the institution is consistently organizing society oriented activity as a best practice.

7) Impact of the practice:- The practice has made an impact on community, students and teachers. Donated blood is being utilized by peoples in neighboring areas. The blood is also being utilized by the patients suffering from accident victims, hemophilic, surgeries, infants, patients battling cancers and many other diseases. The voluntary blood donations camps have resulted in great impact on all stakeholders as well on community. The impact is also apparent on personality development, moral education, on civic responsibility and is reflected in reduction of indiscipline and enhanced the sense of the responsibility among the students. It has also created a sense of managerial ability among the students for organizing such type of events.

6) Problems encountered and resources required:-

Though the motive of the institution is clear, it is painstaking to bring large number of students and the needy on a single platform of rural area institution.
